# **DISCUSSION**

In 2014, Assembly Bill (AB) 1817 was signed by Governor Brown designating the last two full weeks of April and September to be High School Voter Education Weeks. The Board adopted a proclamation on April 11, 2017 proclaiming April 16-29, 2017 and September 17-30, 2017 as "High School Voter Education Weeks" in Shasta County. This initiative is supported by California Secretary of State, Alex Padilla.

AB 1817 and the Board's proclamation provided an opportunity for high schools and their students to partner with county elections officials to promote civic education and participation on campus and foster an environment that cultivates lifelong voters and active citizens. The activities provided nonpartisan information to high school students to encourage them to participate in the election process. Students learned how to register to vote, how to vote by mail, how to find information about candidates and issues, and how to find election results. Students were also encouraged to become Student Poll Workers for upcoming 2018 elections.

Also in 2014, Senate Bill (SB) 113 was signed by Governor Brown allowing 16- and 17-year-olds to pre-register to vote. Preregistration does not change the voting age, but allows those individuals to be automatically registered to vote as soon as they turn 18. Students participating in High School Voter Education Weeks activities became Voter Registration Coordinators and assisted individuals in pre-registering and registering to vote.

# **ALTERNATIVES**

One of the responsibilities of government leaders is to encourage all eligible citizens to register and vote; therefore, there are no alternatives recommended.

# **OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT**

# **RECOMMENDATION**

As introduced on October 3, 2017, enact an ordinance of the Board of Supervisors of the County of Shasta amending Chapter 8.45 of the Shasta County Code regulating Smoking in Shasta County.

# **SUMMARY**

This action will amend certain provisions of Chapter 8.45 of the Shasta County Code concerning Smoking in Workplaces and Enclosed Public Places to add a new section designed to extend protection from second hand smoke to all unenclosed areas at all Shasta County locations owned or controlled as part of a lease by the County of Shasta for the HHSA for the benefit of clients, visitors, and staff. This action will also update Section 8.45.080, Posting of Signs, to conform with the addition of the unenclosed areas named in newly added Section 8.45.031 and update and streamline Section 8.45.120 to enhance smoking ordinance enforcement.

# **DISCUSSION**

In 1993, Chapter 8.45 of the Shasta County Code was adopted by the Board to define and prohibit smoking in workplaces and enclosed public places and to prohibit the sale of cigarettes in vending machines to protect county residents from the significant health hazards associated with smoking and second-hand smoke. Smoking is responsible for the premature deaths of four hundred eighty thousand Americans each year from lung and other cancers, heart disease, respiratory illness, and other diseases. Tobacco smoke is also a major contributor to indoor air pollution and responsible for approximately forty thousand deaths among nonsmokers each year from many of the same diseases listed above.

After thorough review of the scientific evidence, the Board approved an amendment to Chapter 8.45 of the Shasta County Code on December 16, 2014 to also protect the residents of, persons employed in, and persons who frequent the county from the harmful effects of electronic smoking devices.

The Shasta County HHSA strives to promote and model good health and protect employees and clients from the harmful effects of second hand smoke and vape. Extending smoking restrictions to include all unenclosed spaces as well as enclosed spaces will protect employees and visitors from second hand smoke, and enhance HHSA's ability to promote and model good health. As a result, HHSA is requesting the Board consider adding Section 8.45.031 to restrict smoking and the use of electronic smoking devices in unenclosed areas of County owned or leased HHSA facilities. HHSA is also requesting the Board consider amending Section 8.45.080, Posting of Signs, to remove the word "enclosed" from the first sentence. This minor change will extend the existing signage requirements from enclosed areas to include the newly added HHSA facility unenclosed areas as well.

Finally, HHSA is requesting the Board consider amending subsection A of Section 8.45.120, to remove the second sentence to enhance smoking enforcement and more closely align with current state tobacco laws. The state labor code section 6404.5.9(c) was amended in 2016 to clarify that "An employer or owner-operator of an owner-operated business shall not knowingly or intentionally permit, and a person shall not engage in, the smoking of tobacco products at a place of employment or in an enclosed space." HHSA is tasked with enforcement of violations of Chapter 8.45 and amending this subsection A of Section 8.45.120. will allow for a more even application of the requirements of Chapter 8.45 to owners and patrons within any enclosed area of a public place.

Other local organizations and counties have similar smoke free campus policies including Mercy Medical Center Redding, Shasta Regional Medical Center, Mayers Memorial Hospital, Shasta Community Health Center, Simpson University, and the Health and Human Services Agencies of Nevada, Sutter, Tehama, Yolo and Yuba counties.

# ALTERNATIVES

The Board could elect not to approve the proposed amendment to Chapter 8.45 of the Shasta County Code, or could elect to approve certain changes but not others.

# **OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT**

County Counsel has approved the ordinance as to form. The recommendation has been reviewed by the County Administrative Office

# **FINANCING**

Support for education, signage, and implementation of this amendment of Chapter 8.45 of the Shasta County Code has been included in Public Health's Fiscal Year 2017-18 Adopted Budget including the Tobacco Education Program funding received annually as an allocation from the state. There is no additional General Fund impact with the adoption of the ordinance.

#### ORDINANCE NO. SCC 2014-06

### AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF SHASTA AMENDING CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF CHAPTER 8.45 OF THE SHASTA COUNTY CODE CONCERNING SMOKING AND THE USE OF ELECTRONIC CIGARETTES IN WORKPLACES AND ENCLOSED PUBLIC PLACES

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Shasta ordains as follows:

### SECTION I. Amendment of Section 8.45.010 of the Shasta County Code

Section 8.45.010 of the Shasta County Code is amended to read in its entirety as follows:

#### 8.45.010 Findings and Purpose

The board of supervisors of the county finds that:

- A. Smoking is responsible for the premature deaths of approximately four hundred eighty thousand Americans each year from lung and other cancers, heart disease, respiratory illness, and other disease.
- B. Tobacco smoke is a major contributor to indoor air pollution and is responsible for approximately forty thousand deaths among nonsmokers each year.
- C. Breathing sidestream or secondhand smoke is a significant health hazard for certain population groups, including children, elderly people, individuals with cardiovascular disease, and individuals with impaired respiratory function, including asthmatics and those with obstructive airway disease.
- D. Health hazards induced by breathing sidestream or secondhand smoke include lung cancer, heart attack, respiratory infection, decreased exercise tolerance, decreased respiratory function, broncho-constriction, and bronchospasm.
- E. Nonsmokers breathing sidestream or secondhand smoke may experience a loss of job productivity or may be forced to take periodic sick leave because of adverse reactions to breathing smoke.
- F. Credible studies have demonstrated that there are health concerns regarding the use of electronic smoking devices by users of the devices and bystanders.
- G. Although electronic smoking devices do not produce the same smoke as conventional tobacco product cigarettes, they do produce a cloud of vapors

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> containing dangerous substances to which users and bystanders are exposed. Existing studies on electronic smoking devices' vapor emissions and cartridge contents have found a number of dangerous substances and concerns including:

- 1. The existence of chemicals known to the State of California to cause cancer such as formaldehyde, acetaldehyde, lead, nickel, and chromium;
- 2. The existence of very small particulate matter that reaches deep into the lungs (PM 2.5), xylene, acrolein, tin, toluene, and aluminum, which are associated with a range of negative health effects such as skin, eye, and respiratory irritation, neurological effects, damage to reproductive systems, and even premature death from heart attacks and stroke;
- 3. An increase in the reports of poisonings from electronic smoking devices and products, including acute poisonings of young children;
- 4. The existence of nicotine in most electronic smoking devices. Nicotine is a highly addictive neurotoxin included in the Proposition 65 list of Chemicals Known to the State to Cause Cancer or Reproductive Toxicity and is known to cause birth defects. Nicotine is a component of the emissions from electronic smoking devices containing nicotine and involuntarily exposes non-users to nicotine.
- H. Scientific studies and FDA testing have demonstrated that the solutions in electronic smoking devices contain toxic chemicals and that labeling has often misrepresented nicotine content contained in the devices.
- I. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has reported that from 2011-2013, the use of electronic smoking devices by never-smoking U.S. middle and high school students more than tripled, including more than a quarter of a million never-smoking 6-12 graders who initiated using electronic smoking devices.
- J. There are products other than electronic smoking devices approved by the FDA for smoking cessation. To date, scientific studies have not consistently demonstrated significant benefit of electronic smoking devices for smoking cessation and these devices are not approved by the FDA for smoking cessation.
- K. With certain exceptions, state law prohibits smoking inside public buildings and at places of employment.
- L. The use of electronic smoking devices in locations where the smoking of tobacco is prohibited may cause confusion and uncertainty, and make it more difficult to enforce smoke-free environments and other prohibitions on smoking tobacco.

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- M. The smoking of tobacco, or any other weed or plant is a proven danger to health.
- N. The health, safety, and general welfare of the residents of, persons employed in, and persons who frequent the county would be benefitted by the elimination of smoking and the use of electronic smoking devices in workplaces and enclosed public places.

The board of supervisors of the county finds and declares that the purposes of this chapter are (1) to protect the public health and welfare by prohibiting smoking (which includes the use of electronic smoking devices) in enclosed public places and places of employment; and (2) to guarantee the right of nonsmokers to breathe smoke-free air, and to recognize that the need to breathe smoke-free air shall have priority over the desire to smoke.

#### SECTION II. Amendment of Section 8.45.020 of the Shasta County Code

Section 8.45.020 of the Shasta County Code is amended to read in its entirety as follows:

#### 8.45.020 Definitions

The following words and terms are used and defined as follows for the purposes of this chapter, unless the context in which any word or term is used requires another usage or meaning:

"Bar" means an area or establishment which is devoted to the serving of alcoholic beverages for consumption by guests on the premises and in which the serving of food, if any, is only incidental to the consumption of such beverages. Although a restaurant may contain a bar, the term bar shall not include the restaurant dining area.

"Business" means any sole proprietorship, partnership, joint venture, corporation or other business entity formed for profit-making purposes, including retail establishments where goods or services are sold as well as professional corporations and other entities where legal, medical, dental, engineering, architectural, or other professional services are delivered.

"Electronic Smoking Device" means an electronic and/or battery-operated device, which can be used to deliver an inhaled dose of nicotine or other substances. "Electronic Smoking Device" includes any such device, whether manufactured, distributed, marketed, or sold as an electronic cigarette, an electronic cigar, an electronic cigarillo, an electronic pipe, an electronic hookah, or any other product name or descriptor. "Electronic Smoking Device" does not include any product specifically approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for use in the mitigation, treatment, or prevention of disease.

"Employee" means any person who is employed by any employer in consideration for direct or indirect monetary wages or profit, and any person who volunteers his or her services for a nonprofit entity. Ordinance No. SCC 2014-06 December 16, 2014 4 of 7

"Employer" means any person, partnership, corporation, or governmental, public, or other nonprofit entity, which employs the services of one or more employees.

"Enclosed area" or "Enclosed" means all space between a floor and ceiling which is enclosed on all sides by solid walls or windows (exclusive of door or passage ways) which extend from the floor to the ceiling, including all space therein screened by partitions which do not extend to the ceiling.

"Place of employment" means any enclosed area under the control of an employer which one or more employees normally frequent during the course of employment, including, but not limited to, work areas, employee lounges and restrooms, conference and class rooms, employee cafeterias and hallways. A private residence is not a place of employment unless it is used as a child care, health care, or other care providing facility which is required by state law or regulation to be licensed as such.

"Public place" means any place to which the public is invited or in which the public is permitted, and includes without limitation those places specified in Section 8.45.030(B). A private residence is not a public place.

"Restaurant" means any restaurant, coffee shop, cafeteria, sandwich stand, private or public school cafeteria, and any other eating establishment which gives or offers for sale food to the public, guests, or employees, as well as kitchens in which food is prepared on the premises for serving elsewhere, including catering facilities, except that the term restaurant shall not include a cocktail lounge or tavern if said cocktail lounge or tavern is a bar as defined in this section.

"Service line" means any indoor line at which one or more persons are waiting for or receiving service of any kind, whether or not such service involves the exchange of money.

"Smoke" means the gases, particles, or vapors released into the air as a result of combustion, electrical ignition, or vaporization of any substance, when the apparent or usual purpose of the combustion, electrical ignition, or vaporization is human inhalation of the byproducts, except when the combusting or vaporizing material contains no tobacco, nicotine, alcohol, nor controlled substance *and* the purpose of inhalation is solely olfactory, such as, for example, smoke from incense. The term "Smoke" includes, but is not limited to, tobacco smoke and smoke or vapors of any kind from Electronic Smoking Devices.

"Smoking" means engaging in an act that generates smoke, such as, for example: possessing a lighted pipe, a lighted hookah pipe, a lighted cigar, operating an Electronic Smoking Device, or a lighted cigarette, of any kind; or lighting or igniting a pipe, a hookah pipe, a cigar, a cigarette or an Electronic Smoking Device, of any kind.

"Sports arena" means a sports pavilion, gymnasium, health spa, boxing arena, swimming pool, roller or ice skating rink, bowling alley, and other similar enclosed place where members of

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the general public assemble either to engage in physical exercise, participate in athletic competition, or witness sports events.

"Stadium" means a stadium or arena with open-air seating.

"Tobacco Product" means any product that contains tobacco, is derived from tobacco, or contains synthetically produced nicotine and is intended for human consumption. "Tobacco Product" does not include any cessation product specifically approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration for use in treating nicotine or tobacco dependence.

"Vending machine" means any self-service device or object holding goods which are intended for sale to individual consumers and which are delivered to the purchaser mechanically or passively upon the insertion of currency or tokens into the device.

### SECTION III. Amendment of subsection (B) of Section 8.45.050 of the Shasta County Code

Subsection (B) of Section 8.45.050 of the Shasta County Code is amended to read in its entirety as follows:

B. Each employer having an enclosed place of employment located within the county shall adopt, implement, make known and maintain a written smoking policy which shall contain the following requirements:

Smoking shall be prohibited in all enclosed facilities within a place of employment without exception. This includes common work areas, auditoriums, classrooms, conference and meeting rooms, private offices, elevators, hallways, medical facilities, cafeterias, employee lounges, stairs, restrooms, and all other enclosed areas.

### SECTION IV. Amendment of Section 8.45.070 of the Shasta County Code

Section 8.45.070 of the Shasta County Code is amended to read in its entirety as follows:

### 8.45.070 Prohibition of vending machine sales.

- A. "Vending machine" means any machine or device designated for or used for the vending of cigarettes, cigars, tobacco, electronic smoking devices, or tobacco products upon the insertion of coins, bills, trade checks, or slugs.
- B. No cigarette, electronic smoking device, or tobacco product may be sold, offered for sale, or distributed by or from a vending machine or appliance, or any other device designed or used for vending purposes.

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#### SECTION V. Amendment of Section 8.45.080 of the Shasta County Code

Section 8.45.080 of the Shasta County Code is amended to read in its entirety as follows:

#### 8.45.080 Posting of Signs

Signs saying "No Smoking" or displaying the international "No Smoking" symbol (consisting of a pictorial representation of a cigarette enclosed in a red circle with a red bar across it) shall be clearly, sufficiently, and conspicuously posted in every building or other place where smoking is prohibited by this chapter, by the owner, operator, manager, or other person having control of or occupying such building or enclosed area. The posting of any sign allowing or encouraging smoking in such a place is prohibited. Any failure to comply in whole or in part with the requirements of this section shall not relieve any person or entity from any obligation to comply with any other provisions of this chapter applicable to such person or entity.

#### SECTION VI. Amendment of Section 8.45.140 of the Shasta County Code

Section 8.45.140 of the Shasta County Code is amended to read in its entirety as follows:

#### 8.45.140 Other applicable laws and regulations.

- A. This chapter shall not be interpreted or construed to permit smoking where it is otherwise restricted by any other applicable law.
- B. This chapter shall not be interpreted or construed to permit smoking where it is otherwise restricted in any establishment, facility, or location by any employer, owner, operator, manager, or other person who exercises control over such establishment, facility, or location.

#### **SECTION VII.**

All other provisions of Chapter 8.45 of the Shasta County Code not specifically amended by this ordinance remain in full force and effect.

#### SECTION VIII.

If any section, subsection, subdivision, paragraph, sentence, clause, or phrase of this ordinance, or its application to any person or circumstance, is for any reason held to be invalid or unenforceable, such invalidity or unenforceability shall not affect the validity and enforceability of the remaining sections, subsections, subdivisions, paragraphs, sentences, clauses, or phrases of this ordinance, or their application to any other person or circumstance.

### **SECTION IX.**

All former ordinances and resolutions, or parts thereof, conflicting or inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed. The adoption of this ordinance shall not in any manner affect any action or prosecution for violation of ordinances in effect prior to the effective date of this ordinance, be construed as a waiver of any license, fee, or penalty required by or resulting from any such ordinance, or affect the validity of any bond (or cash deposit in lieu thereof) required to be posted, filed, or deposited pursuant to such ordinance.

#### SECTION X.

This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect 30 days after its passage. The Clerk shall cause this ordinance to be published as required by law.

8.45.010 Findings and purpose.

The board of supervisors of the county finds that:

A. Smoking is responsible for the premature deaths of four hundred thirty-four thousand Americans each year from lung cancer, heart disease, respiratory illness and other disease;

B. Tobacco smoke is a major contributor to indoor air pollution and is responsible for fifty-three thousand deaths among nonsmokers each year;

C. Breathing sidestream or secondhand smoke is a significant health hazard for certain population groups, including children, elderly people, individuals with cardiovascular disease, and individuals with impaired respiratory function, including asthmatics and those with obstructive airway disease;

D. Health hazards induced by breathing sidestream and secondhand smoke include lung cancer, heart attack, respiratory infection, decreased exercise tolerance, decreased respiratory function, broncho constrictions, and branchospasm;

E. Nonsmokers breathing sidestream or secondhand smoke may experience a loss of job productivity or may be forced to take periodic sick leave because of adverse reactions to breathing smoke; and

F. The smoking of tobacco, or any other weed or plant is a proven danger to health.

The health, safety, and general welfare of the residents of persons employed in, and persons who frequent the county would be benefited by the elimination of smoking in workplaces and enclosed public places.

The board of supervisors of the county finds and declares that the purposes of this chapter are (1) to protect the public health and welfare by prohibiting smoking in enclosed public places and places of employment; and (2) to guarantee the right of nonsmokers to breathe smoke-free air, and to recognize that the need to breathe smoke-free air shall have priority over the desire to smoke. (Ord. 93-3 § 2 (part), 1993)

### 8.45.020 Definitions.

The following words and terms are used and defined as follows for the purposes of this chapter, unless the context in which any word or term is used requires another usage or meaning:

"Bar" means an area or establishment which is devoted to the serving of alcoholic beverages for consumption by guests on the premises and in which the serving of food, if any, is only incidental to the consumption of such beverages. Although a restaurant may contain a bar, the term bar shall not include the restaurant dining area.

"Business" means any sole proprietorship, partnership, joint venture, corporation or other business entity formed for profit-making purposes, including retail establishments where goods or services are sold as well as professional corporations and other entities where legal, medical, dental, engineering, architectural or other professional services are delivered.

"Employee" means any person who is employed by any employer in consideration for direct or indirect monetary wages or profit, and any person who volunteers his or her services for a nonprofit entity.

"Employer" means any person, partnership, corporation, or governmental, public or other nonprofit entity, which employs the services of one or more employees.

"Enclosed area" means all space between a floor and ceiling which is enclosed on all sides by solid walls or windows (exclusive of door or passage ways) which extend from the floor to the ceiling, including all space therein screened by partitions which do not extend to the ceiling. "Enclosed" shall mean the condition of being an enclosed area.

"Place of employment" means any enclosed area under the control of an employer which one or more employees normally frequent during the course of employment, including, but not limited to, work areas, employee lounges and restrooms, conference and class rooms, employee cafeterias and hallways. A private residence is not a place of employment unless it is used as a child care, health care, or other care providing facility which is required by state law or regulation to be licensed as such. "Public place" means any place to which the public is invited or in which the public is permitted, and includes without limitation those places specified in Section 8.45.030(B). A private residence is not a public place.

"Restaurant" means any restaurant, coffee shop, cafeteria sandwich stand, private or public school cafeteria, and any other eating establishment which gives or offers for sale food to the public, guests, or employees, as well as kitchens in which food is prepared on the premises for serving elsewhere, including catering facilities, except that the term restaurant shall not include a cocktail lounge or tavern if said cocktail lounge or tavern is a bar as defined in this section.

"Service line" means any indoor line at which one or more persons are waiting for or receiving service of any kind, whether or not such service involves the exchange of money.

"Smoking" means inhaling, exhaling, burning or carrying any lighted cigar, cigarette, pipe or other object containing tobacco or any other plant or combustible substance in any manner or in any form.

"Sports arena" means a sports pavilion, gymnasium, health spa boxing arena swimming pool, roller or ice skating rink, bowling alley and other similar enclosed place where members of the general public assemble either to engage in physical exercise, participate in athletic competition, or witness sports events.

"Stadium" means a stadium or arena with open-air seating.

"Vending machine" means any self-service device or object holding goods which are intended for sale to individual consumers and which are delivered to the purchaser mechanically or passively upon the insertion of currency or tokens into the device. (Ord. 93-3 § 2 (part), 1993)

8.45.030 Prohibition of smoking in county buildings and enclosed public places.

A. Smoking is prohibited in:

1. All enclosed areas of all buildings or other structures which are owned or leased by the county or any agency or department thereof; and

2. All vehicles which are owned or leased by the county or any agency or department thereof.

B. Smoking is prohibited in all those enclosed areas of any public place which are intended to be accessible to or which are customarily used by the general public. Such public places include, but are not limited to the following:

1. Buses, taxicabs and other means of public transit which are based in and subject to the authority of the county;

2. Public transit stations or depots;

3. Retail stores and any other commercial outlets open to all or any segment of the public;

4. Restaurants, including those in private clubs;

5. Bars, including those in private clubs;

6. Aquariums, galleries, libraries and museums;

7. Any theater or other facility which is primarily used for exhibiting any motion picture, stage, drama lecture, musical recital or other similar performance, except that actors may smoke as part of a stage production performed therein;

8. Sports arenas and convention halls;

9. Every room, chamber, or other place used for public meetings or public assembly while a meeting which is open to the general public is in progress and for a period of time preceding such meeting as necessary to ensure that residual smoke is not present during the meeting;

10. Waiting rooms, sleeping rooms, hallways, wards and semiprivate and private rooms of private and public health facilities, including, but not limited to, hospitals, clinics, physical therapy facilities, doctors' offices and dentists' offices;

11. Malls and other multiple-unit commercial facilities;

12. Polling places;

13. Bingo parlors;

14. Offices when open to the public, including but not limited to attorneys' and other professionals' offices;

15. Banks;

16. Laundromats;

17. Hotels and motels, except as provided in Section 8.45.060;

18. Educational facilities;

19. Retail service establishments; and

20. Restaurants, hotel and motel conference or meeting rooms and public or private assembly rooms if one or more employees normally frequent the enclosed area during the course of employment and while the area is being used for private functions.

C. Without limiting the generality of subsection B of this section, smoking is specifically prohibited in the following areas of any public place:

1. Waiting areas (only if the public place is enclosed);

2. Restrooms;

3. Service lines (only if the public place is enclosed);

4. Elevators; and

5. Lobbies, hallways and other common areas.

D. Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, any owner, operator, manager, or other person who controls any establishment or facility may declare that entire establishment or facility as a nonsmoking establishment, whether enclosed or not. (Ord. 93-3 § 2 (part), 1993)

8.45.040 Regulation of smoking in stadiums.

Smoking shall be prohibited in all seating sections and within twenty feet of such sections of any stadium during any public event held at such stadium. This section shall not be construed to permit smoking in any enclosed areas of a stadium in which smoking is otherwise prohibited by any provision of this chapter. (Ord 93-3 § 2 (part), 1993)

8.45.050 Regulation of smoking in places of employment.

A. Except as provided in subsection E of this section, smoking is prohibited in all enclosed places of employment. Each employer associated with each such place of employment shall make reasonable efforts, as necessary, to ensure that all enclosed areas in the place of employment controlled by such employer are free from tobacco smoke or other smoke emanating from smoking products. As used in this subsection, "reasonable efforts" shall not include the incurring of any expense to make structural or other physical modifications. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent an employer in its discretion from making any such modifications on a voluntary basis.

B. Within ninety days of the effective date of the ordinance codified in this chapter, each employer having an enclosed place of employment located within the county shall

adopt, implement, make known and maintain a written smoking policy which shall contain the following requirements:

Smoking shall be prohibited in all enclosed facilities within a place of employment without exception. This includes common work areas, auditoriums, classrooms, conference and meeting rooms, private offices, elevators, hallways, medical facilities, cafeterias, employee lounges, stairs, restrooms, and all other enclosed areas.

C. The employer shall communicate the requirements of subsection B of this section to all employees concurrently with adoption of the smoking policy.

D. An employer shall supply a written copy of the employer's smoking policy which includes such requirements upon request to any current or prospective employee of such employer.

E. Subsection A of this section shall apply to any enclosed workplace occupied by a single individual, whether a sole proprietor, sole employee of a closely-held corporation or otherwise, if such workplace shares with any other enclosed workplace a common heating, cooling or ventilation system or any other opening through which smoke may pass into any other enclosed workplace.

F. Subsection A of this section shall apply to those enclosed areas of buildings owned or used by private clubs, fraternal organizations, health clubs and similar groups, if one or more employees normally frequent the enclosed area during the course of employment and while the area is being used by members or guests of the club, organization or group. (Ord. 93-3 § 2 (part), 1993)

8.45.060 Where smoking not regulated.

A. Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, the following areas shall not be subject to the smoking restrictions of this chapter:

1. Private residences, except when used as a child care, health care, or other careproviding facility required to be licensed as such by any governmental entity; and

2. Hotel and motel rooms rented to guests. (Ord. 93-3 § 2 (part), 1993)

8.45.070 Prohibition of vending machine sales.

A. "Tobacco vending machine" means any machine or device designated for or used for the vending of cigarettes, cigars, tobacco, or tobacco products upon the insertion of coins, bills, trade checks or slugs.

B. Effective January 1, 1994, no cigarette or other tobacco product may be sold, offered for sale, or distributed by or from a vending machine or appliance, or any other device designed or used for vending purposes. (Ord. 93-3 § 2 (part), 1993)

8.45.080 Posting of signs.

Within thirty days of the effective date of the ordnance codified in this chapter, signs saying "No Smoking" or displaying the international "No Smoking" symbol (consisting of a pictorial representation of a burning cigarette enclosed in a red circle with a red bar across it) shall be clearly, sufficiently and conspicuously posted in every building or other place where smoking is prohibited by this chapter, by the owner, operator, manager or other person having control of or occupying such building or enclosed area. The posting of any sign allowing or encouraging smoking in such a place is prohibited. Any failure to comply in whole or in part with the requirements of this section shall not relieve any person or entity from any obligation to comply with any other provisions of this chapter applicable to such person or entity. (Ord. 93-3 § 2 (part), 1993)

8.45.090 Nonretaliation.

No person or employer shall discharge, refuse to hire, discipline. or in any manner retaliate against any employee or applicant for employment because such employee or applicant claims or exercises any right to a smoke-free environment afforded by this chapter. (Ord. 93-3 § 2 (part), 1993)

8.45.110 Enforcement.

A. The tobacco control/education division of the department of public health shall have authority to communicate with employers and those having control of any place wherein smoking is regulated or prohibited pursuant to this chapter for the purposes of providing information, notifying of alleged violations of this chapter, informally attempting to resolve disputes that may arise hereunder, or otherwise implementing the provisions of this chapter in a manner not inconsistent with this chapter or any other laws.

B. Any owner, manager, operator, or employee of any establishment regulated by this chapter may inform persons in violation of any provision of this chapter of the appropriate provisions thereof.

C. The department of resource management shall verify, while an establishment is undergoing otherwise mandated inspections, that the posting requirements of Section 8.45.080 are met and may issue citations for violations of that section.

D. This chapter may be enforced by the public health officer and his or her designees, who shall have the authority to issue citations pursuant to Section 8.45.120. (Ord. 93-3  $\S$  2 (part), 1993)

8.45.120 Violations and penalties.

A. It is a violation of this chapter for any person who owns, manages, operates or otherwise controls the use of any enclosed area of a public place subject to regulation under this chapter to fail to comply with any applicable provision of this chapter. However, an owner, manager, operator or employee of an enclosed area described in Section 8.45.030(B) or (C) is not obligated to enforce the prohibition against smoking in the enclosed area as against a customer or other member of the public visiting the enclosed area, and the failure to enforce the prohibition shall not subject the owner, manager, operator or employee to prosecution under this chapter.

B. It is a violation of this chapter for any person to smoke in any area where smoking is prohibited by the provisions of this chapter.

C. Any person in violation of any provision of this chapter shall be guilty of an infraction, punishable by a civil fine not exceeding one hundred dollars for each violation.

D. A separate offense is committed for each and every day, or part of a day, during which any violation is caused, committed, continued or permitted. Each offense is punishable separately from every other offense. (Ord. 93-3 § 2 (part), 1993)

8.45.130 Public education.

The department of public health shall engage in a continuing program to explain and clarify the purposes and requirements of this chapter to persons affected by it, and to guide owners, operators, and managers in their compliance with it. Such program may include publication of a brochure for affected businesses and individuals explaining the provisions of this chapter. (Ord. 93-3 § 2 (part), 1993)

8.45.140 Other applicable laws.

This chapter shall not be interpreted or construed to permit smoking where it is otherwise restricted by any other applicable law. (Ord. 93-3 § 2 (part), 1993)

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### ORDINANCE NO. SCC 2017-\_\_\_\_

### AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF THE COUNTY OF SHASTA AMENDING CHAPTER 8.45 OF THE SHASTA COUNTY CODE, REGULATING SMOKING IN SHASTA COUNTY

The Board of Supervisors of the County of Shasta ordains as follows:

SECTION 1. Chapter 8.45 of the Shasta County Code is amended as follows:

Section 8.45.031 is hereby added to the Shasta County Code:

- 8.45.031 Prohibition of smoking in unenclosed areas owned, or controlled as part of a lease, by the County of Shasta for the Health and Human Services Agency as set forth in this sub-section.
  - A. The Shasta County Health and Human Services Agency (HHSA) strives to promote and model good health and protect employees and clients from the harmful effects of second hand smoke. As a result, the Board of Supervisors finds and declares that smoking in unenclosed areas of County owned or leased HHSA facilities is prohibited.
  - B. Definitions:

"Unenclosed area" or "unenclosed" means any space which is not an "enclosed area" or "enclosed" as those terms are defined in Section 8.45.020 of this chapter, located within the boundaries of property owned, or controlled as part of a lease, by the County of Shasta for the HHSA where smoking is not otherwise prohibited by any other section of Chapter 8.45 of the Shasta County Code or any State or Federal statute, rule, or regulation.

Section 8.45.080 is hereby amended in its entirety:

### 8.45.080 Posting of signs.

Signs saying "No Smoking" or displaying the international "No Smoking" symbol (consisting of a pictorial representation of a cigarette enclosed in a red circle with a red bar across it) shall be clearly, sufficiently, and conspicuously posted in every building or other place where smoking is prohibited by this chapter, by the owner, operator, manager, or other person having control of or occupying such building or area. The posting of any sign allowing or encouraging smoking in such a place is prohibited. Any failure to comply in whole or in part with the requirements of this section shall not relieve any person or entity from any obligation to comply with any other provisions of this chapter applicable to such person or entity.

Subsection A of Section 8.45.120 is hereby amended in its entirety to read

as follows:

8.45.120 Violations and penalties.

It is a violation of this chapter for any person who owns, manages, operates or otherwise controls the use of any enclosed area of a public place subject to regulation under this chapter to fail to comply with any applicable provision of this chapter.

This ordinance amendment shall take effect and be in full force and effect 30 days after passage. The Clerk of the Board shall cause this ordinance to be published as required by law.

# **RECOMMENDATION**

Take the following actions: (1) Approve a budget amendment transferring appropriations in the amount of \$8,500 within the Health and Human Services Agency (HHSA)-Business and Support Services Branch budget to move appropriations to the Information Technology budget; and (2) increase appropriations and revenue by \$8,500 in the Information Technology budget to purchase a new server capital asset for the HHSA Kofax project.

# **DISCUSSION**

On June 20, 2017, the Board of Supervisors approved an agreement with Western Integrated Systems to provide the Kofax Transformation Module software. Kofax software will streamline the process of scanning invoices by HHSA Business and Support Services Branch (BSS) Accounts Payable staff by extracting selected data (i.e., invoice number, vendor number, etc.) from scanned invoice image files, potentially reducing manual key entry/errors and increasing filing efficiency using software components such as document review and validation to ensure data extraction is accurate. On September 22, 2017 the County Administrative Office approved the purchase of the new server capital asset. The requested budget amendment will provide for a new capital asset server to be used specifically for the Kofax project.

# **ALTERNATIVES**

The Board could choose not to approve the budget amendment. This is not recommended due to the need for an additional server for the Kofax project.

### **OTHER AGENCY INVOLVEMENT**

Information Technology has reviewed the recommendation. The Auditor-Controller has reviewed the recommendation. This recommendation has been reviewed by the County Administrative Office.

### **FINANCING**

The HHSA-BSS budget (50205) is moving \$8,500 from Services and Supplies to a Transfer Out IT account within the HHSA-BSS budget; no increase in overall appropriations. The Information Technology (92500) budget is increasing appropriations in a current capital asset server account and revenue in a Transfer In from HHSA account. The IT budget amendment requires a 4/5 vote of the Board. There is no additional General Fund impact with the approval of the recommendation.

This catastrophic event set into motion calls from Butte County to outside agencies for assistance, including requests to the Shasta County Sheriff's Office (SCSO). SCSO provided resources and personnel support to Butte County during the immediate crisis and beyond.

SCSO provided personnel to support the Butte County Sheriff's Office (BCSO) to assist with a number of Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the California Office of Emergency Services (CalOES) related tasks in reference to the Spillway Incident post-Imminent Threat. These tasks included organizing and training BCSO staff for future incidents.

## OPERATIONAL AGREEMENT Between County of Butte And County of Shasta

This Operational Agreement (OA) is by and between the County of Butte, a political subdivision of the State of California, hereinafter referred to as "County" through its <u>Butte County Sheriff's Office</u> (BCSO) and County of Shasta, a political subdivision of the State of California, hereinafter referred to as "Contractor" through its <u>Shasta County Sheriff's Office</u> (SCSO). This OA shall set forth the types and terms of collaborative services between BCSO and SCSO in relation to services.

### **PURPOSE:**

The Spillway Incident in Oroville, a FEMA declared disaster, necessitated the need for BCSO to obtain some assistance with a number of FEMA and CalOES related tasks to properly manage the Spillway Incident post-Imminent Threat. Additionally, tasks shall be completed to organize and train BCSO staff for future incidents. This OA is intended to facilitate management of the Spillway Incident.

### SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED POST-IMMINENT THREAT (Term of Services 3/6/17-6/9/17):

### Duties and Responsibilities of Contractor:

- Critique BCSO's response to the Spillway Incident for Patrol Operations and Jail Operations (two distinct critiques) by interviewing BCSO staff and reviewing documentation.
- Conduct inter-agency critiques of the Spillway Incident with participating agencies, one each for Patrol and Jail.
- Prepare written 'Executive Summary' of BCSO response to the Spillway Incident during emergency evacuation.
- Prepare After-Action Report (AAR) for submission to CAL OES.

### Duties and Responsibilities of COUNTY:

- Cooperate fully with Contractor to accomplish tasks listed within this OA.
- Provide Contractor's assigned staff with office space and equipment required to perform these duties.

### SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED FOR FUTURE INCIDENTS (Term of Services 6/10/17-9/15/17):

### **Duties and Responsibilities of Contractor:**

- Develop an Incident Command Team at BCSO.
- Train Incident Command Team for emergency response to major incidents.
- Make recommendations to BCSO for improved infrastructure for future incidents.

### Duties and Responsibilities of BCSO:

• Cooperate fully with Contractor's assigned staff to accomplish tasks listed within this OA.

• Provide Contractor's assigned staff with office space and equipment required to perform these duties.

TERM: The term of this OA shall become effective March 6, 2017 through September 15, 2017.

**COMPENSATION:** Contractor's Employee's typical work schedule is Monday through Wednesday on week 1 and Monday through Thursday on week 2 for a maximum total of 56 hours per two weeks. The hourly rate for Contractor's Employee is \$50.92. Maximum payable for each term of service is \$19,961 for a not-to-exceed MOU total of **\$39,922**.

SCSO shall prepare an invoice to include timecards indicating days/hours contractor's assigned staff worked. SCSO shall submit invoice to BCSO monthly or quarterly.

### CONFIDENTIALITY:

A. Contractor and Contractor's assigned staff shall maintain the confidentiality of all County records and information.

### MUTUAL HOLD HARMLESS:

It is agreed that CONTRACTOR shall defend, hold harmless and indemnify County, its officers and employees from any and all claims for injuries or damage to persons and/or property which arise out of the terms and conditions of this OA and which result from the negligent acts or omissions of the CONTRACTOR, its officers and/or employees.

It is further agreed that County shall defend, hold harmless and indemnify CONTRACTOR its officers and employees from any and all claims for injuries or damage to persons and/or property which arise out of the terms and conditions of this OA and which result from the negligent acts or omissions of County, its officers and/or employees.

In the event of concurrent negligence of the CONTRACTOR its officers and/or employees, and County, its officers and/or employees then the liability for any and all claims for injuries or damages to persons and/or property which arise out of the terms and conditions of this OA shall be apportioned under principles of comparative negligence as established presently by California law, or as may be hereafter modified.

### **INSURANCE:**

A. County and Contractor shall maintain all required insurance for the duration of this OA. Both County and Contractor are self-insured and maintain excess insurance coverage.

### **ALTERATION OF TERMS:**

The body of this OA fully expresses all understandings of the parties concerning all matters covered and shall constitute the total OA. No addition to, or alteration of, the terms of this OA whether by written or verbal understanding of the parties, their officers, agents or employees shall be valid unless made in the form of written amendment to this OA which is formally approved and executed by all parties.

On August 22, 2017, the Board tentatively allocated the remaining Title III funds and initiated a 45-day comment period. No comments were received. Final approval is recommended.

## ALTERNATIVES

The Board may decline to allocate remaining Title III funds. They would revert to the federal treasury.
